## Frieze Art Week Preview: 11 Must-See Furnishings at NYC's Collective 2 Design Fair

Highlights from one of the best satellite shows during New York City's buzziest week for art collectors.

THIS WEEK, AN international set of collectors and design enthusiasts will descend upon New York City for the Frieze Art Fair and the cluster of satellite shows that cater to established collectors as well as novices who may just be acquiring their first piece of art. While there's no question that Frieze will dominate the week ahead, the

smaller shows attract their own crowds of loyal supporters, particularly the Collective 2 Design Fair (May 8-11).

For the second year running, Collective welcomes a niche community of collectors with an eye for everything from antique Tiffany lamps to contemporary furniture shown by over 30 galleries hailing from Mexico City to London. This year, the show features a special exhibition of the work of the internationally acclaimed Dutch industrial designer Hella Jongerius as part of a focus on Scandinavian design.

What should you see if you have only an hour to walk the show? Scroll through our curated guide of 11 gorgeous furnishings to buy—or at least Pin—now.

You, too, can own one of the original Ikea children's sets. Check out Kinder Modern for a pint-size pop of Swedish color. *Karin Mobring, "Anna Armchair/ Tabl."* 



Kinder Modern also specializes in mid-century children's furniture—ranging from rocking horses like this one to miniature desks and chairs. "Woven Rope Child Chair"



While the fair will focus on Swedish design, work by Italian designers will be prominently displayed at many of the participating galleries, including this piece by Carlo de Carli at Nicolas Kilner Gallery. *Carlo de Carli, "Model no. 802"* 



The work of the Belgian designer Ado Chale has been exhibited internationally and even collected by the British and Saudi royal families. *Chale, "Maya"*
