The award-winning, New York-based interior designer shares her favorite pieces of the moment

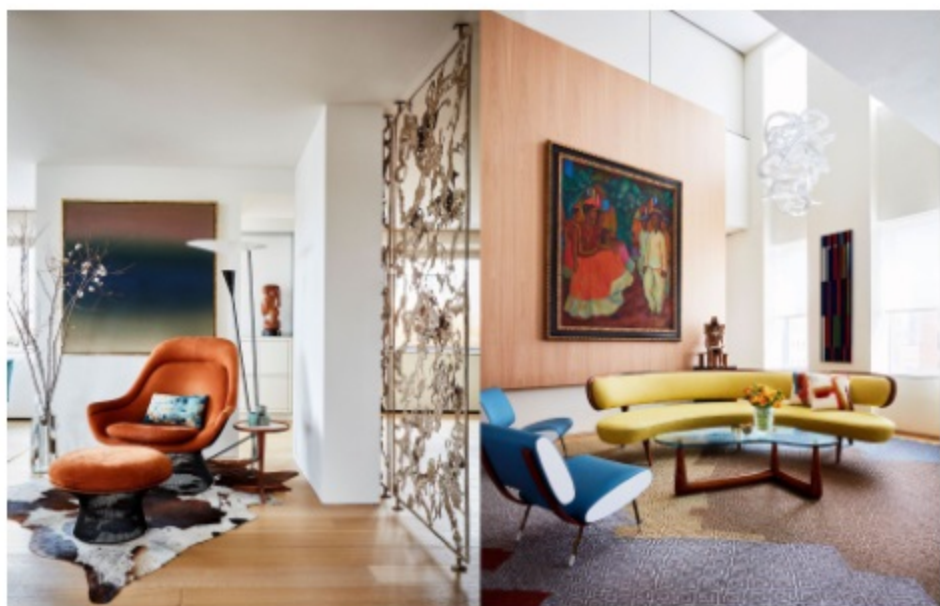

Chest of Drawers by Wendell Castle, 1962

“This museum-worthy chest of drawers was created by the American sculpture and furniture artist, Wendell Castle. This particular piece was created in 1962, very early in his career, and showcases some of the first times where he introduces stack lamination as a new process, which allowed him such infinite flexibility.”

“I’m particularly enamored by this piece as it appears to be rendered from terrazzo. This effect is painstakingly achieved by using pieces of colored shards blown from previous glass and fused together against opaque white, giving this vase its unique pattern. This excellent artisanship is very economical at only \$335.00.”
